

Course Syllabus - Montana History / World Geography

Welcome to Montana History. This class is going to be focused on looking through social, economic, political lens of Montana history to understand our past to help our future in relation to Montana and the U.S for the 1st semester. In the 2nd semester we will be studying world geography, this ranges from physical to human geography. In this class you will be asked to look at current events, write papers, take notes on lectures, work on individual and group projects, create presentations, as well as read and analyze primary and secondary sources.

Course Materials / Schoology

Students will need a notebook with paper and a pen/pencil every day. Also students will need a small binder to keep daily work in.

Grading

Grading Policy: Homework, Classwork, Participation, Tests, Quizzes, and Projects will all be weighted the same but will vary in amount of points each is worth.

- **Grading Scale**
 - A = 93%-100%
 - B = 83% - 92%
 - C = 73%-82%
 - D = 65%-72%
 - F = 64% and below
- **Semester Grade**
 - 1st Quarter 47.5%
 - 2nd Quarter 47.5%
 - Semester Final 5%

Extra Credit: There will not be any extra credit given on an individual basis. All extra credit will be given to the class as a whole. There will be a 60 point maximum per semester and you can choose from the following options for your extra credit:

- Read a historical book or biography (agreed upon with me) and write a 3-4 page analysis of the historical context of the book (60 pts possible) 1 per semester
- Read a current event article at least 1 page in length and write a summary of the article and its context within society today at least 1 page in length (10 pts possible) up to 6 per semester

Color and label a map from the extra credit bin. Must be neat, legible, and labeled correctly to receive credit. (1 point possible) up to 10 per semester

Latework

Per the student handbook, students are allowed two days to make up an assignment for everyday absent. If after that time or a student is present and does not turn in an assignment, they have 1 week to turn in the work for 50% credit. After 1 week, students will have until the end of the quarter to turn in missing work for 25% credit (Remember anything is better than a ZERO).

It is YOUR responsibility to get your make-up work, whether you know you will be gone or miss a day. All missed work will be placed in a folder and ready for you to pick up. For extra clarification on the missed assignments or needed help, YOU need to come in on your own time to get that help.

Expectations

For this class to work, the expectation is that your opinion is just as valuable as others so DO NOT ridicule others views/opinions, make any sort of racist, sexual, derogatory, or sexist statement (even if you are trying to be funny). If this happens you will be removed from class immediately and be subject to detentions. This needs to be a “safe” environment where students are able to explore different ideas and values through the scope/lens of others. .

 - Do not ridicule others or their opinions
 - Take care of the classroom
 - Not anyone else's responsibility to clean up after you

This is considered cheating and you will receive a zero for the assignment
